This concludes the article by Aileen M Ireland, Reader Services Division of the National Archives of Ireland, Bishop Street, Dublin. This listing is provided to make finding the access to relevant material extracted from the Church of Ireland registers of Baptisms and sometimes Marriages between 1808 and 1922 when many of these registers were destroyed. I have purchased the six reels of film and donated them to the Society of Australian Genealogists where they will be accessioned on Monday, 19 April 2010. From this date the films will be available for look up. I do not have time to index the extractions and SAG members using the films will generally find more than just the claimant's details. They often will find the claimant's brothers and/or sisters, parents names often with the date and place of marriage. Sometimes other families of the same surname were also extracted and recorded. Help to access and read these films will be available on Tuesdays, except for the third Tuesday of the month from the author.

Familia, a Genealogical Source again exceeds its aim and rewards readers with a series of interesting articles from a selection of authors and editors. I particularly liked the article by Gillian Hunt about the 1901 and 1911 Ireland census records. These have been made available by the National Archives of Ireland in an easy to access database free on-line with access unrestricted. The

digitised pages are attached for downloading and/or printing. All 32 counties are available for 1911 and 1901 will be available later this year. Many of the articles refer to all four provinces and not just the six counties in Ulster Province now known as Northern Ireland.

This is the twenty fifth edition of *Familia* which, in its conception and then in its first ten years of its production, owed much to its first editor, the late Ken Darwin. The *Irish Times* obituary on pages vi-viii provides an overall review of the life and times of Ken Darwin, a former head of the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland. I had met Ken several times since the 1980s at and around the Ulster Historical Foundation and its activities. Ken’s foresight has led to the preservation of many archival records and documents being access into a secure archive. Rest in Peace Ken.

Familia is recommended for all libraries, family history groups and individuals with an interest in Irish history and genealogy.

Shipping Routes to and from Australia and New Zealand:

The site www.findboatpics.net.au lists and/or includes pictures and images of ships to Australia and New Zealand from 1918-1970 as well as ships which carried service men and women from these counties to the Middle East, Singapore, New Guinea and back from the Middle East in World War 2.

An earlier site, www.findboatpics.com provides details of passenger and emigrant ships to Australia and New Zealand including a list of ships and where to find pictures of them. It has details of about 700 sailing ships from 1840 to 1880 and 500 steamers from 1880 to 1914.

Deceased Online is the first central database of statutory burial and cremation registers for the **UK and Republic of Ireland** - a unique resource for family history researchers and professional genealogists. Searching is free, and can be restricted as required to country, region, county, or individual burial authority or crematorium. However, once you find a record of possible interest, you do have to pay a fee to read all the details.
